Charles Dickens was born in in 1812, the second of eight children. When Charles was years old, the Dickens family moved to In 1824, John Dickens, Charles's father, was imprisoned for in Marshalsea Prison with his wife and children. Charles was taken out of school and sent to in Warren's Blacking for about five months. He worked hours in miserable conditions and the experience marked him for life. When his father was from prison Charles was able to stop work in the factory. He went to school for more years and then became an apprentice in a firm. Hoping to become a journalist, he taught himself shorthand and then became a freelance reporter. Later he worked as a parliamentary reporter and, using a pseudonym, began contributing articles on contemporary London life. Dickens wrote novels, several stories, and was editor of popular periodicals. He was an ardent campaigner for reform.

He is buried in Poet's Corner, Abbey with the inscription: "He was a sympathiser to the, the suffering, and the oppressed; and by his death, one of England's writers is lost to the world."
