Present simple and Present continuous

<i>Present Simple</i>	<i>Present Continuous</i>
We use the present simple for: • things that we do regularly • facts and truths • habits • permanent situations We often use adverbs of frequency and time expressions like every day, once a week, on Fridays. Examples: I check my email every day. (regular activity) Sheryl works at the bank. (permanent situation) Bears hibernate in winter. (fact)	We use the present continuous for: • things that are happening now • – at the time we are speaking, • temporary situations • activities that are in progress We often use time expressions like at the moment, today, this week, at the moment, right now, etc. <i>Just a minute. I'm checking my email.</i> (now) <i>She usually works in London, but she's working from home this week.</i> (temporary situation) <i>I'm studying Economics</i> (activity in progress, it's not complete)

With the present simple we say:

I play tennis
You play tennis
We play tennis
They play tennis
He/she/ it plays tennis.

With the present continuous we say:

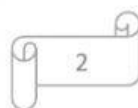
I am playing tennis
You are playing tennis
We are playing tennis
He/she/it is playing tennis

PRESENT SIMPLE FORM

(TO SPEAK)	AFFIRMATIVE	NEGATIVE	QUESTION FORM
I	speak	don't speak	Do I speak?
YOU (SINGULAR)	speak	don't speak	Do you speak?
HE/SHE / IT	speaks	doesn't speak	Does he speak?
WE/YOU/THEY	speak	don't speak	Do they speak?

PRESENT CONTINUOUS FORM

(TO LEARN)	AFFIRMATIVE	NEGATIVE	QUESTION FORM
I	am learning	I'm not learning	Am I learning?
YOU (SINGULAR)	are learning	aren't learning	Are you learning?
HE/SHE / IT	is learning	isn't learning	Is she learning?
WE/YOU/THEY	are learning	aren't learning	Are we learning?



With the **present simple** we use these frequency adverbs:

(Notice that **the adverb comes before** the main verb in the sentence.)

- Always: 'I always **read** before I go to bed.'
- Often: 'Her sister often **comes** shopping with us.'
- Frequently: 'Michael frequently **visits** his family.'
- Sometimes: 'You sometimes **go** to the gym, don't you?'
- Occasionally: 'It occasionally **rains** in summer.'
- Seldom: 'They seldom **ask** for help.'
- Rarely: 'He rarely **goes** out without his backpack.'
- Hardly ever: 'I hardly ever **eat** pizza.'
- Never: 'Japanese people never **wear** shoes inside.'

Time Expressions we use with the **Present Continuous** 

With the present continuous we use these time expressions:

(Notice that the time expression can come at the start or at the end of the sentence.)

At the moment: 'I'm watching TV, **at the moment**.'

These days: 'Paul's living in Cardiff, **these days**.'

Now: 'What are you doing **now**?'

Nowadays: 'I think you are eating too much **nowadays**.'
