

Dr Who theme – Delia Derbyshire



Composer Delia Derbyshire created a new soundscape with electronic sounds, setting the tune to Doctor Who - one of the most famous TV shows of all time. The famous tune was written by Australian composer Roy Grainer. Delia was tasked with arranging the theme using electronic sounds to fit the futuristic sci-fi nature of the show.

Derbyshire's version uses "**found sounds**" that have been electronically manipulated. She would record the sounds of everyday objects on tape and then change the speed of the tape to create different pitches or loop individual sounds over and over to create rhythms. This was in 1963, before computers made such tests easy!

Listen to the opening credits of the Dr Who theme arranged by Delia Derbyshire
The theme is made up of 2 main musical ideas. What are they?

Now listen to three versions of the theme (not necessarily in this order) and fill in the table as you listen.

Delia Derbyshire used only 'found sounds' for her version of the theme – she chose objects rather than conventional instruments and instead of playing them live she recorded them and manipulated the recordings. You are going to have a go at creating and manipulating some 'found sounds' as well as creating your own melody.

Part 1 – Compose your own Dr Who melody

In pairs, write a theme each to play alongside the Dr Who bass line. The theme will come in at bar 5, allowing 4 bars for an introduction. Follow the chord progression and make sure the notes of your theme fit the chord for that bar. Make sure each bar adds up to 4 beats. Write your theme down using notation or letter names and then learn to play it on the keyboard.

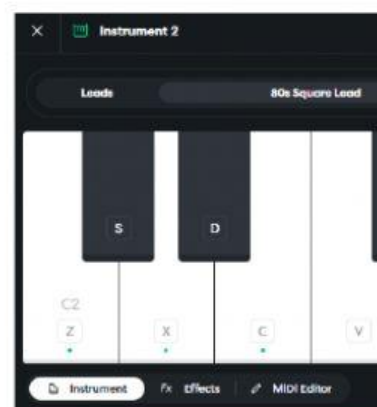
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Part 2 - Create your own arrangement on BandLab

1. Open up bandLab and  new project.
2. Change project key to E minor and bpm to 130
3. Invite your partner and your teacher. 
4. Import Dr Who bass layer 1 and bass layer 2. 
5. Add a virtual instrument track for you to be able to input your theme on a keyboard.



6. Record in the 2 themes that you have composed - connect your chromebook to a keyboard. Listen to the introduction and start recording after 4 bars. Once you have recorded your theme, change the sound of your theme, using different 'instruments' and 'effects'. *Possible instrs.-'80s square lead, arcade lead, big synth lead/ etc. Effects could be reverb, chorus, phaser etc.*
7. Now add other loops and sound effects – e.g. Sci Fi packs/ loops/ one shots. Make sure you sync them with your pre- existing tracks.



9. Record your own sound effects ('found sounds') and input these into BandLab at appropriate points. The sounds can be 'found sounds' using everyday objects, real instruments, body percussion, vocal sounds etc.
10. Manipulate the sounds using effects to create a suitable Sc-Fi sound scape.
11. Experiment with panning, fade in etc.
12. Keep saving your work and layering different sounds, loops etc. Be creative!
