ERRORS TO LOOK FOR

Section 1. Articles

There is an error with articles in nearly all tests. Students commonly fail to find and correct such errors. Study this section to improve your chances of scoring this mark.

Step 1 – Reminder

The definite article **the** commonly refers to

- something specific or unique (*the Singapore River, the Queen*)
- one or more persons or things already mentioned – or familiar

The indefinite article **a** (before a consonant) or **an** (before a vowel) commonly refers to

- something for the first time in a text
- one single thing

Study the usage in the passage below, where the articles have been highlighted for you. At each usage, check how that usage fits the explanation given above. Repeat your reading until you are sure you understand.

When **the** Dalai Lama laughs, it is like **a** bell ringing. I first realised this at **an** event called Creating A Happier World, promoted by **the** organisation Action for Happiness. **The** event was to launch **a** new course about happiness. **The** co-founders of **the** organisation include George Mulgan, **an** author and social theorist who has trained as **a** Buddhist monk, been **a** van driver for **the** musical group Red Wedge and acted as **a** policy advisor to **a** Prime Minister. **The** other co-founder is Richard Layard, **an** economist, **an** expert on mental health and **the** author of *Happiness: Lessons from a New Science*, **a** new approach to economic priorities.

Step 2

Sift **the** flour and salt into **a** large mixing bowl with **a** sieve held high above the bowl so the flour gets an airing. Now make a well in the centre of the flour and break the eggs into it. Then begin whisking the eggs - any sort of whisk or even a fork will do - incorporating any bits of flour from around the edge of the bowl as you do so.

Next, gradually add small quantities of the milk and water mixture, still whisking. When all the liquid has been added, use a rubber spatula to scrape any elusive bits of flour from around the edge into the centre, then whisk once more until the batter is smooth, with the consistency of thin cream. Now melt the 50g of butter in a pan. Spoon 2 tbsp of it into the batter and whisk it in, then pour the rest into a bowl and use it to lubricate the pan, using a sheet of kitchen paper to smear it round before you make each pancake.

TEST 2

Carefully read the text below, consisting of 12 lines, about how an earthquake happened.

An 8.0-magnitude earthquake struck part of the Solomon Islands on 6 February. This earthquake triggers a tsunami and numerous aftershocks, including at least three with magnitudes greater than 6.0. The tsunami killed at least five people and also damage homes in several villages. The centre of the quake was situated 81 kilometres west by the town of Lata on Santa Cruz Island, at a depth of 28.7 kilometres beneath the seafloor, according to a report by the U.S. Geological Survey. It occurred either on or near the boundary over two plates of the Earth's crust, which the northeast-moving Australian plate dives beneath the Pacific plate. Typical, large earthquakes are common in areas where such plate collisions occur. An earthquake happened where one side of the fault pushed upwards, causing move of the seafloor to displace a huge volume of water. That event unleashed a tsunami that reached several islands in the region.
