Global school climate strikes

Hundreds of thousands of children and young people are walking out of lessons around the world on Friday as the school strike movement continues to snowball.

Climate strikes (0) ___ in more than 1,400 cities in more than 110 countries. Organisers say the number of young people (1) ___ is set to top the 1.4 million people who (2) ___ in the global day of strikes in March.

The global campaign – (3) ___ by Swedish teenager Greta Thunberg – comes amid increasing (4) ___ about the unfolding climate crisis, especially among young people.

Last year, the UN's (5) ___ scientists warned that there were just 12 years to limit climate catastrophe. Earlier this month, another UN report warned that the widespread collapse of ecosystems was (6) ___ humanity itself at risk. And just last week it emerged that the Antarctic ice is melting much faster than (7) ___ feared and global atmospheric CO₂ emissions reached a record level of 415ppm.

The school strike movement started in August when Thunberg, then 15, held a solo protest outside the Swedish parliament. Since then hundreds of thousands of schoolchildren have taken part in strikes each week around the world from Australia to Canada, Ghana to Germany.

In the UK, more than 100 school climate demonstrations have been planned and organisers say they will focus on the (8) ___ for radical reform of the education system to address the ecological crisis. Noga Levy-Rapoport, of the UK Student Climate Network, which helped organise the events, said climate breakdown posed “a grave (9) ___ to life on Earth”.

“In order to (10) ___ address the crisis, we need our educational institutions to be hubs of sustainability that (11) ___ a space for learning and teaching to prepare today's students to not (12) ___ be those that lead a just transition, but to prepare for a changing world,” she said.

Last month UK youth strikers and Thunberg met Westminster party leaders to highlight the scale and scope of the unfolding crisis.

Agatha Christie's private life

Some years ago, in a little market town on the cusp of Berkshire and Oxfordshire, a lady used to go shopping. Her house was (0) ___ from a road just outside the town, and she used to take that road into the town centre. She might stop at the Nag's Head for a cup of tea, before visiting the department store and (1) ___ the chemist. In the evenings, she might go to the Masonic Hall for a play or a pantomime; she had been (2) ___ to become the President of the local amateur dramatic society, as long as she didn't have to (3) ___ any speeches.

If this doesn't sound like the best-selling novelist of all time, you (4) ___. The lady in question was known in Wallingford as Mrs Mallowan; to the rest of the world, she was Agatha Christie. In a pre-internet, pre-email, pre-Twitter world, Agatha found her perfect space a few miles from Oxford and some way west of London, with (5) ___ poor transport connections, meaning she was (6) ___ many visitors. Here, where she bought Winterbrook House in 1934, she could work on her (7) ___ murder mystery or romantic novel, and relax with her second husband Max Mallowan. Max was already a well-known archaeologist and Agatha loved (8) ___ him to digs in the Near East for several months each year. But Wallingford was something else and, as Max acknowledged many years later, (9) ___ residents helped Agatha to enjoy her new home by (10) ___ her as Mrs Mallowan, respecting her privacy and enabling her to get on with writing. It's hard to imagine, in our era when JK Rowling tweets her thoughts most days to millions of followers, that a famous writer could crave privacy, but Agatha did, and it's to the great credit of Wallingford that she found it here. Agatha and Max lived at Winterbrook for 42 years and now share a gravestone in the church in nearby Cholsey.

The Rosa Parks Barbie

Civil rights activist Rosa Parks is being honored with her own Barbie doll. The toy company Mattel unveiled the new doll for Women's Equality Day on August 26 as part of a range dedicated (0) ____ celebrating inspiring women.

Parks became known as "the mother of the civil rights movement" after she refused to (1) ____ up her bus seat to a white man in Alabama. Her arrest in 1955 started the Montgomery Bus Boycott, which (2) ____ to the desegregation of the transport system.

The Rosa Parks doll is part of the "Inspiring Women Series", dolls based on historical figures that come (3) ____ educational information about the contributions each woman (4) ____ to society, as well as authentic clothing, (5) ____ to CNN. The series also includes a doll honoring Sally Ride, the first American woman in space.

Mattel unveiled the "Inspiring Women Series" to mark International Women's Day last year, with 17 new dolls representing real women to serve as role models, including Olympic snowboarding champion Chloe Kim, artist and activist Frida Kahlo and Wonder Woman filmmaker Patty Jenkins. "Girls have always been able to play out different roles and careers with Barbie and we are thrilled to shine a (6) ____ on real life role models to remind them that they can be anything," Lisa McKnight, Senior Vice President and General Manager of the Barbie brand, said in a statement.

The company's decision was based on a global survey of mothers, in (7) ____ 86% said they were worried about the kind of role models their daughters were exposed to. Some have criticized the new dolls for maintaining the unrealistic proportions and features of the original Barbie.

In 2016, Mattel released three new types of Barbie: curvy, petite and tall. The company was praised (8) ____ opening up to diverse body types, following the introduction of new skin tones and hair textures (9) ____ previous year. The first Barbie to wear a hijab was introduced in 2017. Earlier this year, Mattel introduced a wheelchair Barbie and one with a prosthetic leg.
