

No – Any - None

no/any + noun

- i. We use **no + noun** in sentences with a positive verb
- ii. we use **any + noun** in negatives and questions.
 - I have **no** friends.
 - I don't have **any** friends.
 - Do you have **any** friends?

****any** in affirmative sentences

We can also use **any** in affirmative sentences when it means 'one or some, but it is not important which'.

- You can come **any** weekend. (=one weekend; it doesn't matter which)
- **Any** idiot would know how to use this phone.

none

- i. We use none as a pronoun, i.e., not followed by a noun. We use none to replace countable or uncountable nouns.
 - 'How many friends do you have?' '**None.**'
 - I thought there was some coffee, but there's **none**.
- ii. We can also use **none of** the car/Tom's/etc. + noun
- iii. We can also use **none of** + us/you/them.
 - **None of my students is/are** from France.
 - **None of them is/are** from France.
 - *Note that when **None of** ... is the subject of a sentence, we can use the verb in singular (more formal) or plural form (more informal).
