1	Until 1750 it was the only bridge crossing the Thames in London. The present bridge, built in 1973, replaced one that was sold to a US businessman and rebuilt in Arizona.
2	It's one of the most famous tourist sights in London. It's a tall column with a statue on top and 4 bronze lions round its base.
3	It's a large exhibition hall with a round roof which was built to celebrate the end of the 20th century and the beginning of the 21st century.
4	It's a bell in the clock tower of the Houses of Parliament. Its sound is well known because it has often been used in films.
5	It was built in the 11th century by William the Conqueror. It was a royal palace, a prison, a zoo. Now it is a museum. You can see crown jewels there.
6	It's the tallest (135 m) Ferris wheel in Europe and the most popular attraction in London. One complete turn takes about 30 minutes. The wheel doesn't usually stop to take on passengers.
7	It's a large square in central London. It was named in honour of Lord Nelson's victory at the naval battle of ... in 1805. In the centre of the square is Nelson's Column. You can see a lot of pigeons there.
8	It was built after the Great Fire of London by Sir Christopher Wren. There's the Whispering Gallery there (if a person whispers close to the wall on one side of the gallery, he/she can be heard by another person on the other side of the gallery). Wren is buried there.
9	It's the most famous tennis tournament. It was first held in 1877.
10	It's a bridge across the River Thames and one of the most famous structures in London. It can open in the middle to let large ships come through.
11	You can see a lot of famous people there but they are made of wax.
12	You can see the National Maritime Museum with the Royal Observatory there. Prime Meridian goes through this place.
13	It's a place in Hyde Park where you can make a speech and people can listen to you.
14	It's also known as the Palace of Westminster. You can find it in central London beside the River Thames. The House of Commons and the House of Lords meet there.
15	It's a stone column in central London set up in memory of the Great Fire of London in 1666. It was designed by Sir Ch. Wren.
