Public transportation systems are interdependent with other critical infrastructures (especially the communications and information sectors), and the impact of an incident or event during service provision can have cascading effects because of the complexity and resulting multi-sector vulnerability. For example, most commuters use just-in-time arrival goals in planning their work trips. They know when they are required to be at work and take scheduled public transportation vehicles that will allow for on-time arrival. A serious incident involving the public transportation infrastructure would cause large numbers of employees to be late to work or to not arrive at work at all. This impact is reinforced as their non-productivity would cause similar economic impacts to commerce partners.

Public transportation system (passenger rail including subways, metros, light rail, commuter, and interurban rail) and transportation terminals (bus, rail, terry, intermodal) are vulnerable to terrorist attacks such as a disruption to the transportation infrastructure, which include various types of terrorism and sabotage. Disruptions directed towards public transportation systems can place communities and national security a risk. Significant economic losses and interruption of vital services are also a result d terrorist attacks. Public transportation is also susceptible to secondary impacts from attack directed against the energy, communication and information infrastructure attacks on public facilities.

The Javan tiger (*Panthera Tigris sondaica*) is a subspecies of tiger that lived uniquely on the Island of Java, In Indonesia. It became extinct at the beginning of the 1980s, mainly due to deforestation, hunting, and the loss of its prey.

At the beginning of the 20th century, as the human population on Java increased, so did related human activity and agricultural land use. Hunted and killed by local populations, the Javan tiger also suffered the destruction of its habitat through the expansion of ricefields, teak forests, and coffee and hevea plantations. These crops invaded the Indonesian island and replaced natural spaces, forcing all fauna to survive in ever-shrinking areas, poor in biodiversity.

The scarcity of its two favourite prey: Javan rusa deer (*Rusa timorensis*) and wild boar (*Sus scrota*), and modification of its habitat forced the tiger to look for new sources of nutrition. Monkeys became the feline's main prey. Sadly, in order to feed, it entered into competition with another big cat, much more adapted to primate- hunting (which are arboreal): the Javan leopard (*Panthera pardus melas*). Thus, the last known specimen of tiger was seen in 1976. In the absence of its natural habitat and available prey, the subspecies disappeared.
