

TOO / ENOUGH

Too and enough indicate degree. They modify adjectives, adverbs and nouns.

TOO is an intensifier that expresses that something is **inadequate**

It comes **before** ADJECTIVES and ADVERBS
It is used with **much/many** before nouns

ENOUGH expresses that something is **adequate**.

It comes: - **after** ADJECTIVES and ADVERBS
- **before** NOUNS
- **after** a VERB




Her hair is **too long / long enough**
