The Elgin Marbles is another famous and [CONTROVERSY] _____ exhibit. Taken from the Parthenon temple in 1802 by Lord Elgin, the sculptures are considered a crucial part of Greek history. According to the Greeks, Lord Elgin "looted" the sculptures as well as seriously damaging the monument; however, the British claim that Elgin had the [PERMIT] _____ of the Ottoman authorities to remove them. It wasn't until 1822 during the Greek War of Independence that the Acropolis was handed over to the Greeks, but by then the English Parliament had approved Elgin's [ACQUIRE] _____. No one can make the museum give back the marbles; however, the Greek government will go on campaigning for their return until they are back in Athens. The British Museum is a place dedicated to international understanding, and the advantages of an [ENCYCLOPEDIA] _____ museum are clear to see. But this attempt to bring different cultures together has been self-defeating, ultimately having the opposite effect: taking treasures from other countries has resulted in never-ending international rows. 1. When animals travel from one region or habitat to another, it is called migration. Animals migrate in search of food or a mate. Migration helps animals survive on Earth. Many animals migrate. The monarch butterfly is one of them.	
2. Monarch butterflies are black and orange, and fly the farthest of any insect on Earth. These butterflies migrate 2,000 to 3,000 miles. They travel to the forests of Mexico from the United States and Canada – and back – every year. Since butterflies are so small, a mile is much farther for them than for people. A butterfly's 2,800-mile trip is like a person traveling 275,000 miles. That's like walking around Earth 11 times.	
3. The female monarchs lead the butterflies north from Mexico. Their parents cannot guide them. They died soon after the eggs were laid. How do these butterflies know where to go? The monarchs know where to go by instinct. Sunlight signals them to migrate. Scientists believe that sunlight also shows them where to go.	
4. Each year, the monarch's migration takes several generations. Three or four generations complete the trip north. But only one generation makes the return trip south. During the spring, the first generation hatches in the south. They fly north as far as they can. Then they lay eggs and later die. The second generation continues the journey, lays eggs, and dies. The third and sometimes fourth generations hatch through the spring and summer. They finish the journey north. At the end of the summer, a special super generation hatches. These butterflies live six to nine months, much longer than the generations before them. In the fall when it gets colder in the north, the monarchs fly south. They fly all the way back to the Oyamel forests in Mexico.	
5. Migrating butterflies make a delicious snack for many predators. To keep enemies away, monarchs have built-in protection. Milkweed has toxins in it. When monarch caterpillars eat milkweed, it makes their skin poisonous. It even tastes bad. This keeps predators away. But some predators can withstand the toxins or feed on monarchs without eating their skin. Monarchs need warm temperatures to fly. When temperatures get too low, monarchs will die. Butterflies flock to the trees for shelter during high winds and rain. They cannot fly during bad weather.

When their cruel plan is revealed, the father tries to reconcile with the only child who never lied to him.
_____	B. This epic tale of adventure, deceit and self-sacrifice switches from land to ocean. The main character of the story is either a hero to some, and a villain to others. He walks a thin line between danger and safety, honor and shame, wealth and ruin.
_____	C. After a horrific plane crash leaves a group of adolescent boys stranded on an island, our hero takes on the role of a leader. He aims to organize the survivors into useful groups, working together to ensure everyone's survival. However, things quickly take a turn for the worse, and the boys discover how chaos and savagery take over even the most righteous souls.
_____	D. A spoiled heir of a vast fortune is tricked into going on an adventure to find buried treasure of his ancestors. In his absence, a cunning enemy plans to destroy his family and fortune. Our hero must get back home to stop that from happening, but it's not so easy to get back from the deep jungle.
_____	E. A teenager living in an orphanage has her whole life turned around by a mysterious wealthy gentleman who offers to pay for her schooling. The protagonist is disinherited by his father and must prove himself through battling in tournaments and embarking on a quest. During his travels our hero encounters many instances of injustice and violence, and must fight against the odds to reclaim his rightful place.
_____	H. A young man feels depressed and disappointed with this own life and the people around him. His greatest ambition is to be of use to society, so he sets off on a long journey to find his life's purpose. He travels across Europe, taking part in battles, fighting for inner and outer peace.
