What predictions have come true from the movies?

It's been over 30 years since *Blade Runner* was released and over ten years since *Minority Report*. Both make lots of predictions about the future.

Ridley Scott's 1982 film *Blade Runner* is based on a novel by science fiction writer Philip K. Dick. It is set in an unpleasant futuristic Los Angeles in 2019, where robots called 'replicants' are manufactured for dangerous jobs on other planets. They are banned from Earth and replicants who ignore the ban are hunted down and 'retired' by special police officers called Blade Runners.

Steven Spielberg's 2002 film *Minority Report* is based on another short story by Philip K. Dick, and is set in Washington DC in 2054. In the film's future, there are many technological possibilities, where crime is predicted and it can be prevented.

So which predictions from these movies can we see today?

Iris recognition technology is already a reality for many air travellers. In the film *Minority Report*, crime has been eradicated with technology that monitors citizens. Small devices on walls scan human eyes to confirm their identity. Today, even though this technology can't be used on moving individuals, it is used at border controls all over the world.

Personally targeted advertising is not as advanced in the film, but according to experts, we are not far away from it. In the film *Minority Report* Tom Cruise's character is bombarded by adverts specifically targeted at him. Today, the internet can already match adverts to users' interests. Computer company Intel recently said that their new technology would tailor and release commercial information to specific people at specific times.

English not the universal language. As well as English, citizens in *Blade Runner*'s 2019 Los Angeles speak a mixture of European and East Asian languages. In modern day Los Angeles, 60% of the population no longer speak English as a first language. Some people predict Mandarin Chinese will become the default language of businesses worldwide, and it could also replace English one day.

Gesture-based computer screens can already be seen in touchscreen technology today. Tom Cruise's character in the film puts on a data glove and controls a computer screen with hand gestures. Many smartphones have similar technology with pinch and swipe features, and some game consoles have it, too, allowing users to control the action on screen with just their movements.

So perhaps we really will be living in a similar world to the movies one day.
