

## Future Continuous

☞ Future Continuous (**will be + ing**) is used to talk about actions which will be in progress at a time in the future.

### Examples:

- 💡 Hi, Jen, it's me. Just to say, **I'll be arriving** at 17.15. Can you pick me up?
- 💡 Sure, **I'll be waiting** outside the station.
- 💡 Next week they **will be flying** to Australia from Saudi Arabia.
- 💡 She **will not be working** on Tuesday.
- 💡 Unfortunately, we **won't be attending the wedding**.

☞ The **future continuous tense** is often confused with the **simple future tense**, there are some key differences between the two:

- ✖ The future continuous tense is usually used with **a specified period of time**.
- ✖ The future continuous tense also shows **more certainty** than the simple future tense does.
- ✖ Like all other continuous tenses, you **cannot use the future continuous tense with stative verbs** like want, need, love, or hate. Use the simple future tense with stative verbs instead.
