Future Perfect

Future Perfect (**will have + participle**) is used to express the idea that something will happen before a specific time in the future.

Examples:

- We'll have **taken** our trip by July.
- Don't worry about us, we'll have **already eaten**.
- Next month I **will have worked** for the company for six years.
- I think they'll **have got** there by six o'clock.
- Won't she **have retired** by the end of the year?

Future Continuous vs. Future Perfect

The future perfect tense is used to describe events and actions that would have taken place or will have taken place under certain conditions and circumstances.

Future continuous tense talks about events that will occur in the future at a certain period of time.

When using future perfect, we can use phrases that point out time periods like 'by' to indicate when exactly in the future does the task end.

Example:

We will be done **by** tomorrow morning.
