

Common English idioms for travelling

- To hit the road:** To begin a journey or embark on a trip, often by driving or traveling long distances.
- To catch the sun:** To spend time outdoors and expose oneself to sunlight, typically for relaxation or to achieve a tan.
- To live it up:** To enjoy oneself to the fullest extent, often by indulging in luxurious or exciting experiences.
- On the shoestring:** To travel on a tight budget, making economical choices and spending as little money as possible.
- At the crack of dawn:** Very early in the morning, typically at the first light of day, often used to start activities or journeys early.
- To call it a day:** To decide to end an activity or stop working for the day, often due to exhaustion or completion of tasks.
- Off the beaten track:** Away from the usual tourist destinations or popular routes, exploring less-traveled or remote areas.
- To catch the red-eye:** To take a late-night or overnight flight, often departing in the evening and arriving early the next morning.
- To break the journey:** To pause or interrupt a trip for a short period, often to rest, explore a new location briefly, or split a long journey into manageable parts.
