Pocket money

How ¹ pocket money do teenagers get every week? Do they get ² money? Don't they get ³? These were just ⁴ of the questions that a recent survey in the UK tried to answer.

In the survey, the answers were surprising: 13-year-olds get an average of £45 a month, 16-year-olds get £80, and 18-year-olds get £120! This means that the average British teenager now gets £1,000 a year in pocket money! That's 600% ⁵ than they got 20 years ago!

However, in the survey, a lot of teenagers said that they earn their money by doing jobs around the house. "My parents have already made plans for my weekend," said one teenager.

"I ⁶ clean all the bedrooms and wash all the dishes. If I don't, I won't ⁷ any money."

"It's important that my kids work for their pocket money," said one parent. "I think they ⁸ better citizens in the future." Over 60% of the teenagers in the survey also had some sort of paid employment. Teenagers under the age of 16 do gardening, wash cars, deliver newspapers, and walk dogs, and those over 16 do babysitting or work in a store or restaurant.
