- 2 Check that the writer knows the subject well. Search for their name and other articles they have written.
- 3 Some websites are actually ads. For honest opinions, look for independent reviews on good quality websites.
- 4 Check the date and time of the article.

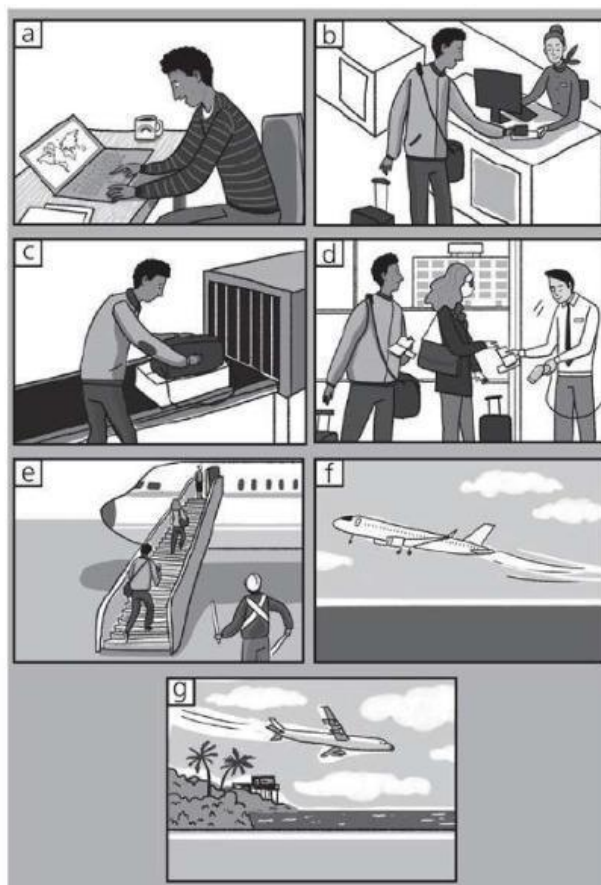
