executive	a person who has an important position as a manager in a business, organization, etc. A chief executive is the person with the highest rank in a company or organization.	nowadays	at the present time, in contrast with the past sth that encourages you (to do sth)
apprentice	a young person who works for a fixed period of time in order to learn the skills needed in a particular job. An apprenticeship is the state of being an apprentice.	incentive	working for yourself and making money from your own business
casual	(of work) not permanent or regular: casual work/labour	self-employed	a person who makes money by starting or running a business, especially one involving financial risk
barman	(female barmaid) a person who serves drinks from behind a bar in a pub	entrepreneur	using your hands
butcher	a person who sells meat	manual	having a high position in a company or organization
handyman	a man who is good at doing practical jobs inside or outside the house, as a hobby or as a job	senior	a job, especially an important one
