	PEOPLE	THINGS	PLACES
EVERY-	everyone everybody	everything	everywhere
SOME-	someone somebody	something	somewhere
ANY-	anyone anybody	anything	anywhere
NO-	none / no one nobody	nothing	nowhere



EVERY-	SOME-
- A synonym of all things/all people/in all places - It should be <u>used with a singular verb</u>.	- A synonym of a thing/a person/a place that is not specified or unknown - It should be <u>used with a singular verb</u>. - It should be <u>used in affirmative statements</u>.
NO-	ANY-
- A synonym of not anything/not anybody/not anywhere - It should be <u>used with a singular verb</u>. - It should NOT be <u>used with another negative word</u> (e.g.: <i>don't, never, not, etc.</i>).	- A synonym of a thing/a person/a place, no matter what - It should be <u>used with a singular verb</u>. - It should be <u>used in negative and interrogative statements</u>. - It should be <u>used for emphasis</u> (without negative).
