Activity 1. Introducing the new vocabulary

kite = a toy consisting of a light frame with thin material stretched over it, flown in the wind at the end of a long string;

Utraan = a festival in India during which people fly kites;

riot = a violent disturbance of the peace by a crowd; an occasion when a large number of people behave in a noisy, violent, and uncontrolled way in public, often as a protest;

torchlight = the light from a burning or an electric torch;

Eid = (from Arabic) the festival or feast of the breaking of the fast;
