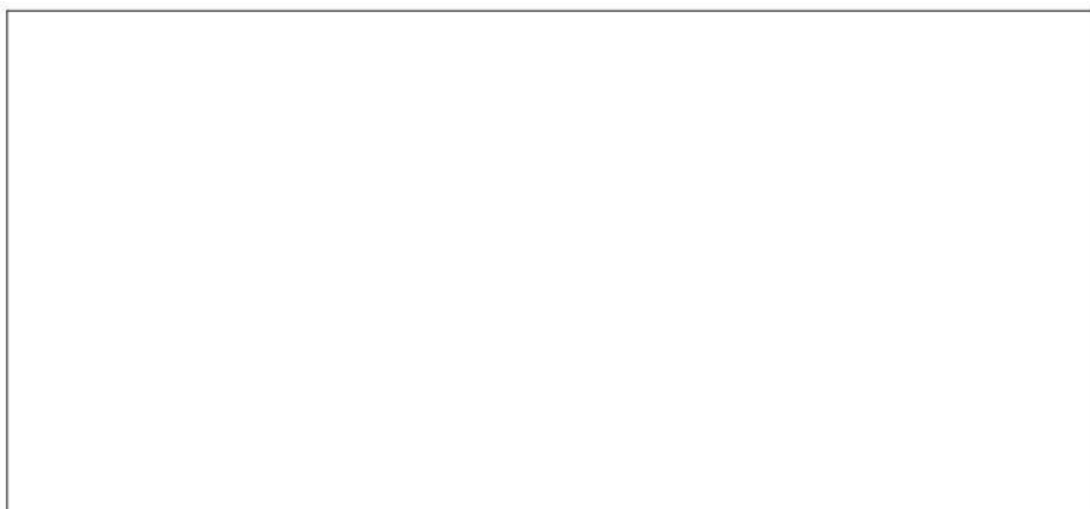

Cooks and Their Books

Jamie Oliver is one of the world's best loved chefs and TV personalities, whose books have been translated into 30 languages and whose programmes have been broadcast in over 100 countries. His inspiration for cooking came from the pub run by his parents, where he picked up many techniques and by the age of eleven, was outperforming many of the chefs there. He left school when he was sixteen to make his way in the food industry. He went to catering college, then received more formal training in France, before returning to London. His lucky break came during the making of a documentary about the restaurant he was working in. Jamie was spotted in the background by the editors, who focused in more and more on this cheeky young chef. The day after the programme was broadcast, Jamie received calls from five different production companies all eager to work with him. Sixteen cookery books and over twenty TV programmes have been the result.

Similarly, 23 year-old Sam Stern has been cooking roast dinners since the age of eight, learning his skills from his mother and becoming a published author at fourteen. He grew up as the youngest of five children. With two of his three sisters being vegetarian, the other a vegan and his brother a virtual carnivore, he started cooking to help his mother get food to the table.

The idea for Sam's book in 2004 came to him after constantly listening to his school friends' envious comments about food in the Stern household. He reasoned that his friends should take up cooking for themselves, if their parents were too busy. He wrote 'Cooking Up a

Storm', with recipes aimed at getting teens into the kitchen. When the book first came out Sam was taken aback at its success. This book can now be read in fourteen languages.

Unlike Jamie Oliver, Sam didn't throw himself into the food industry, although he has produced five more cookery books. He recently graduated from Edinburgh University, where he studied politics, sociology and business. At university he went mainly unrecognised. Although some students had his student cookbook, few noticed they were studying alongside its author. At the start of the year, Sam completed an intensive 12 week cookery course at college to ensure his kitchen skills were up to scratch. He also had limited work experience in a professional kitchen, which did not give him much formal training. He was awarded the highest possible grade for his final university project, so could have a career in politics, if he so chooses. However, his intention is to write more cookery books, and perhaps even open a catering school or have his own restaurant or jazz bar.

He's flattered to be compared to Jamie Oliver but says their focus is different. Jamie's focus has mostly been on healthy eating. Amongst many achievements he's challenged the UK government over the quality of school meals and reminded Americans that their diets are causing obesity. He's drawn attention to the dangers of fast food and has run a TV series to help disadvantaged youngsters get a start in catering. Sam is merely trying to encourage younger people to get cooking for themselves by making it easy and fun. Both chefs are dedicated to using wholesome British ingredients and are doing their bit to improve the eating habits of the nation.
