Read the riddles.

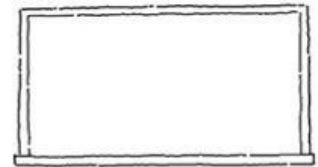
- ① Whose things are these?

Whose things are these?



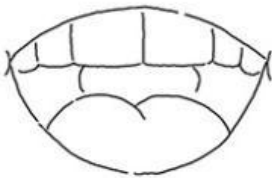
- ② Whose thing is this?

Whose thing is this?



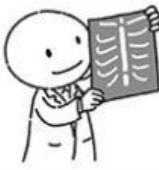
