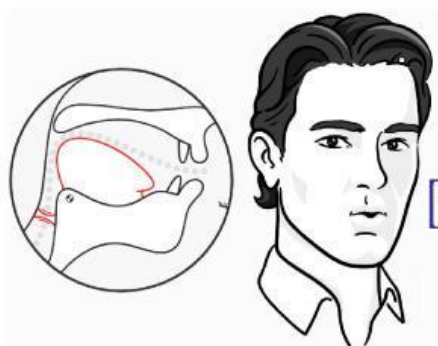

Lips: Tense and in a "whistling" position
Jaw: Almost completely raised
Tongue: High, near the roof of the mouth

[u] In the Middle of Words

food	suit	group

[u] At the End of Words

do	shoe	threw
new	flew	through
you	chew	canoe

The vowel [u] does not occur at the beginning of words in English.
Exception: "ooze."

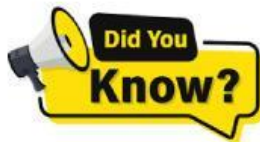

Step-by-step pronunciation instructions:

- **Mouth:** Open your mouth slightly.
- **Lips:** Round your lips slightly and keep them relaxed.
- **Tongue:** Relax your tongue, raise the back high up, and pull it towards your throat.

The vowel [ʊ] occurs only in the middle of words in English.

✚ Less frequent pattern for [ʊ] is letter **O**.

✚ The letter oo followed by **d or k** are usually pronounced [ʊ].

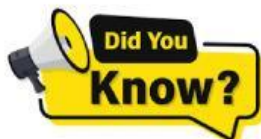


✚ The letter u followed by **sh** is usually pronounced [ʊ].

Little Red Riding Hood

One of our favorite **childhood books** is *Little Red Riding Hood*. A hunter was walking through the **woods**, and he heard Red Riding **Hood's** screams. He shot a **bullet** and killed the **wolf**. Moral of the story: A **wolf** by any other name **is** still a **wolf**.

Lucy: How's the [u] food?

Lou: The [u] cooks [u] prepare [u] unique [u] menus. There's so much to [u] choose [u] from. That's why I [u] usually [u] lose [u] a [u] few [u] pounds before the [u] cruise.

Lucy: Besides eating, what [u] do [u] you [u] do [u] on a [u] cruise?

Lou: [u] You [u] will have a [u] full [u] routine. There is a [u] huge [u] pool, and the [u] crew [u] will take [u] good [u] care of [u] you. [u] You [u] could [u] relax on deck with a [u] cool [u] drink, read a [u] good [u] book, watch a [u] movie, or even take a [u] snooze.
