What Do the Best Movies Have in Common?

Every year, the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences in the United States gives awards called Oscars to people for movies they made in the previous year. They give different awards for different aspects of movie making. For example, they give awards for writing, acting, special effects, and the music. In some years, like 2020 for example, many different movies win awards in different categories. But in other years, one movie wins awards in nearly all categories. The two movies with the most Oscars in the twenty-first century so far are *The Lord of the Rings: Return of the King* (2003), with eleven awards, and *Slumdog Millionaire* (2008), with eight awards. What is it about these movies that makes them so good?

These two movies are very different: for example, one is set in the real world and the other is not. They are in completely different genres. *The Lord of the Rings: Return of the King* is a fantasy adventure movie, which is a genre that is set in an unreal world and usually includes the characters going on a journey. This movie has violent battles and amazing unreal scenes and creatures. The movie won awards for directing, best picture, special effects, writing, and two music awards.

Slumdog Millionaire is a drama set in India. The hero is a young man who has grown up in poverty. His family has very little money, and it's hard for them to buy food and pay for a good place to live. In the movie, he is a winning contestant on a game show. The police think a person like him can't win without cheating, so they arrest him. We see scenes from his life that explain why he knows the answers and ones that bring in a romantic love story and a lot of action. The movie won awards for cinematography, directing, best picture, writing, and two music awards.
