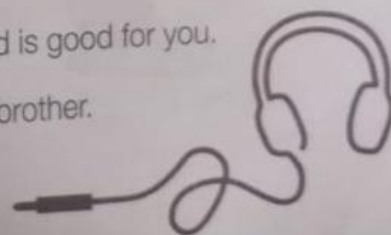

GRAMMAR BOX: THE PAST PERFECT TENSE

POSITIVE SENTENCES

LANGUAGE USAGE	EXAMPLE
Setting actions completed before others were done, start with the noun + the auxiliary verb + the main verb in past participle + the object.	James had read the book before watching the movie.

NEGATIVE SENTENCES

LANGUAGE USAGE	EXAMPLE
Notice example box	Heather hadn't been to Italy before.

INTERROGATIVE SENTENCES

LANGUAGE USAGE	EXAMPLE
Notice example box	Had you ever visited the city before last week?



Past Perfect Tense

The past perfect tense is a grammatical form used to indicate an action that was completed before another **action or time** in the past. It is formed by combining the auxiliary verb "**had**" with the past participle of the main verb.



Subject + had + past participle

Example: She had studied before.



Subject + had not + past participle

Example: They had not finished yet.



Had + subject + past participle?

Example: Had you eaten?



Usage	Example
Completed actions before a specific past time or event	She had finished her homework before dinner.
Reported speech indicating actions before reporting	He said he had already seen the movie.
Expressing unrealized past conditions or hypotheticals	If I had known, I would have come earlier.
Storytelling for background or event sequence	By the time she arrived, the party had started.
With time markers like "before," "after," "by the time," or "already"	After she had eaten, she went for a walk.
