charity shop (noun) – *a shop owned by a charity which receives donated items such as clothes and books and sells them to raise money for their cause.*

charity box (noun) – *a box to collect casual donations, often left in shops or at bars for customers to donate their spare change.*

chugger (noun) – *a combination of 'charity' and 'mugger'; someone who approaches people in the street to request donations for a charity, sometimes aggressively.*

charity begins at home (saying) – *expresses the idea that the priority for anyone is family and friends before other people.*

homeless (adjective) – *used to describe a person without a home.*

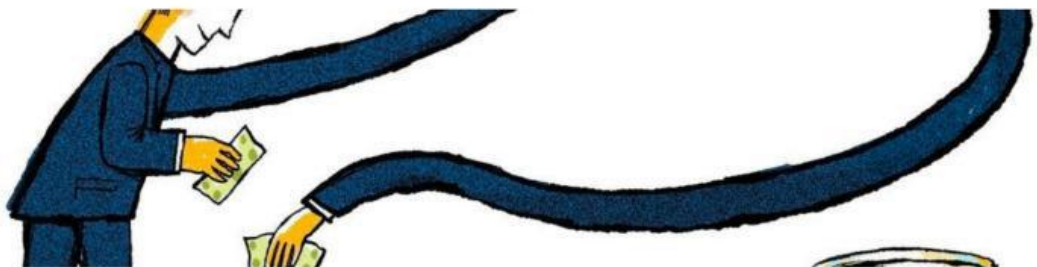
