We use an infinitive with **to** to say why we do something.

I turned on the TV to watch the news. Joanna went to Paris to study music.

Sheila is going to cut her hair.
Sheila is going to have her hair cut.
(= Someone is going to cut it for her.)
She washes her car every Sunday.
She has her car washed every Sunday.
(= Someone washes her car for her.)

I must clean my suit this week.
I must have my suit cleaned this week.
(= I must pay someone to clean it for me.)
I'll mend that broken window.
I'll have that broken window mended.
(= Someone will mend that window for me.)

We sometimes use get instead of have:
I must get my suit cleaned.

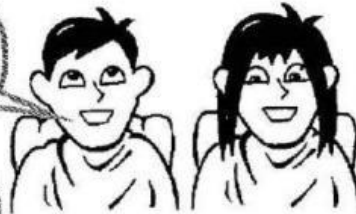

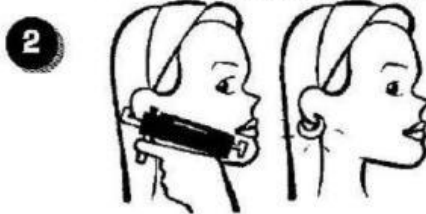

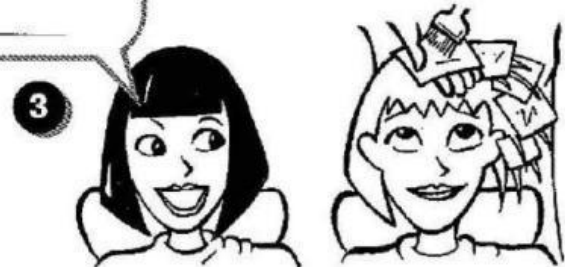
