CHALLENGING JOBS

A friend asked me not too long ago if writing this blog has gotten any easier now that I've been doing it for almost five years. As I sat and thought about his question, I realized I didn't have a clear answer! Certainly some things have gotten easier, but not everything. Harvey Lopez – Civil Engineer

"When I got my first job fresh out of college, even though I had studied a lot, I still felt unsure about what I was doing. My first assignment was on a project for a new 7-story parking garage downtown. My boss asked me to figure out situations where the garage could break apart and collapse. Here I was supposed to be ready for this, I had my degree, I had done my homework, and yet, inside I didn't feel as confident as I thought I would. Instead, these new responsibilities frightened me. I thought as I became more experienced this would change, but this is still the hardest part of my job: that feeling of the unknown—that if I miss something, horrible things could happen. Now there's more advanced technology to help in what I do, but this feeling has never gone away."

Audrey Moore – Chef

"I've been working around food and in restaurants practically all my life. My parents owned a restaurant and I probably spent as much time there as I did at home or school. One thing I learned from them is that a restaurant has two very different worlds. There is inside the kitchen, and outside the kitchen. Inside the kitchen can be a hard environment. Things are moving fast. It's loud. We're constantly running out of stuff—whether it's ingredients, time, or patience. The dining area, however, has to have a completely different atmosphere—laidback and fun, almost like it's on another planet from the kitchen. Even after 45 years of restaurant work, I still find it challenging to deal with the sharp difference between these two worlds."
