If someone makes a perfect copy of a Van Gogh painting, is that person an artist? Sometimes, copies are good enough to trick experts. Clearly, people who can copy paintings so well show great skill. But to decide if they are really artists, we need to understand how art is different from other creative forms.

Art is a creative activity and artists have a natural talent. This is more than a learned skill. Artists use their work to communicate a message.

On the other hand, creative work that produces an item you can make again and again is usually called a craft. It needs a lot of skill, but it is not an expression of feelings. An example of a craft is making jewelry. The products are usually attractive. However, works of art can be beautiful, ugly, frightening, or confusing. Someone once said that art comes from the artist's heart, but crafts come from the maker's mind.

So, we can see that what makes Van Gogh an artist is much more than simply technique. The person who copies a Van Gogh may have incredible skills, but they are not an artist.
