Yakutsk – the coldest town on earth. From November to March, it's only light for three or four hours a day, and the temperature hardly ever rises above freezing. The average daytime temperature is -30°C and at night it sometimes falls as low as -60°C . Now that's cold!

Life in the extreme cold is difficult. At -20°C , the air freezes inside your nose. At -40°C , you can't stay outdoors for more than ten minutes or your skin freezes. At -45°C , the metal on your glasses sticks to your face! It often takes me half an hour to get ready to leave the house and another half an hour to take off all my warm clothes when I get home. I don't go out very much! People only walk short distances from one warm place to another. All activities happen indoors – from shopping to sports. A popular local sport is kyyly – a kind of jumping competition. It uses a lot of energy and it keeps you warm and strong. I try to do it three or four times a week. You need to keep fit when you live in sub-zero conditions!

In summer, Yakutsk is a different city. In June and July, it's the season of 'white nights', when the sky never gets dark, not even at midnight. The snow melts and the temperature rises to 30°C and more, but most people are happy to have a heat wave after ten months of winter. Camping and barbecues are the favourite summer activities, with parties all night long. I can't wait for summer!
