## The Lewis and Clark Expedition

Directions: Read the selection and answer the twelve questions.

In the early 1800s the people of the United States knew very little about the land west of the Mississippi River. It was necessary to send explorers to learn and map out that part of the country acquired by the Louisiana Purchase. President Thomas Jefferson chose Meriwether Lewis and William Clark to lead



an expedition to find the Pacific Ocean.

Both men were in the army, and they were close friends.

Lewis and Clark set off from St. Louis, Missouri with a group of over thirty men. Their journey began on May 14, 1804 by canoeing up the Missouri River. Along the course, the expedition made journal records

of animals, plants, minerals and weather. Lewis and Clark made careful maps of their route, showing the latitude and longitude of landmarks along the way.

The journey was exciting, but not tranquil. Lewis and Clark depended heavily on Native Americans for help. One, such advisor was the incredible Shoshone woman, named Sacajawea [SAK-uj-juh-WEE-uh]. Sacajawea led the men through rough and risky territory. For part of the journey, she served as guide and interpreter, because she not only knew the lay of the land, but how

to find food and translate languages. From Native American tribes, she borrowed horses that the group could use on the most challenging portion of the trip, which was crossing the brutal Rocky Mountains.

Once the expedition crossed the Continental Divide, they followed the westward-flowing Clearwater and Snake Rivers. Finally the group floated down the Columbia River. On October 7, 1805 Clark wrote in his journal "Ocean in view! O!

"The Joy!" Lewis and Clark had accomplished their objective of reaching the Pacific Ocean.

The group's time on the Pacific coast was miserable because it rained for over one hundred days. They camped in a crude fort they built themselves, called Fort Clatsop. With only a small food supply, they stayed three months, and then departed for their return to Missouri.

The expedition arrived in St. Louis on September 23, 1806, where they were welcomed with admiration and cheering. Having traveled 7,689 miles with only one person's death, the expedition proved to be one of the greatest explorations in
