The Legend of Cantuña



The decision by Franciscan monks to have a large church constructed in Quito is where this story begins. They hired an **indigenous**, robust and ambitious man called Cantuña to do the job and offered him an important amount of money. The only condition to get the payment was that the church must be finished in six months.

Cantuña worked hard every day, but the huge amount of work, and the unlimited number of **unforeseen** obstacles cause the construction to be delayed. He knew that it would be impossible to complete the task in time as the deadline approaches. On the last day, Cantuña was about to give up when suddenly, the devil **came out of nowhere** and offered him a deal: “*Cantuña, if you give him your soul, the church will be finished before the end of the night,*” said the devil. Cantuña stood resolute, staring the demon, meeting it **face-to-face** thinking about the deal, which he finally agreed because he knew he had no other choice.

Thousands of little demons appeared instantly and began effortlessly **lifting** the stones. The church's walls rose quickly, and Cantuña knew the devil would fulfill his part of the deal on time, so he decided to attempt to trick him. The Legend of Guayas and Quil

Spanish conquerors, under the command of Sebastián de Benalcázar arrived at the Ecuadorian coast in the 16th **century** with the intention of defeating the native tribes, including the Huancavilcas. Guayas, a valiant and **honorable** chief, and his wife Quil, a valiant warrior who fought with him, were the leaders of the Huancavilcas tribe. Collectively, they represented their people's might and solidarity. The Huancavilcas put up a valiant fight, but the Spaniards ultimately **prevailed**. After being captured, Guayas and Quil were taken before Benalcázar, who asked that in return for their lives, they confess the location of their tribe's riches. Guayas agreed to guide the Spanish to the fortune, but his real goal was not to submit.

The treasures were presumably hidden on a hill that Guayas and Quil were brought to, which is now known as Santa Ana Hill. Guayas requested a **blade** so that the stone covering the **entryway** could be lifted. Eager to get their reward, the Spaniards gave him the blade. Guayas turned to Quil in a heartbreaking act of rebellion and, heartbroken, took her own life to protect her from **slavery**. Then, preferring death to a life of slavery, he committed suicide. Their people and future generations were inspired by this selfless deed, which turned into a potent symbol of freedom and resistance.



Legend of the Atahualpa's Treasure

In 1532, after a bloody civil battle with his brother Huascar, Spanish conqueror Francisco Pizarro captured the Inca emperor Atahualpa. Pizarro put Atahualpa in Cajamarca, taking the chance of destroying a **struggling** empire. Atahualpa offered an unprecedented offer: *a room full of gold* in an attempt to gain his freedom. The Inca emperor ordered Rumiñahui, his **trustworthy** commander, to collect the treasures from all around the empire after Pizarro **greedily** accepted. The Spanish betrayal was quick; Pizarro assassinated Atahualpa just because he thought the incoming army would arrange a rescue.

Rumiñahui acted immediately to keep the treasure out of Spanish hands after knowing of Atahualpa's death. He gave the order to hide the treasure deep within the northern Ecuadorian Llanganates Mountains. The **legendary** Inca riches were finally buried in this isolated and dangerous region, which was marked by swamps, thick vegetation, and mist-covered peaks. Despite his inevitable capture and torture, Rumiñahui kept the location of the treasure unknown and carried it with him to his death.

In the search for Atahualpa's treasure, explorers and treasure hunters have faced the hostile Llanganate environment for ages. Expeditions have been dangerous due to the region's rough terrain and harsh **weather**, but the prospect of unthinkable treasure still attracts fortune-seekers today. The legend is still a mystery that sparks people's interest worldwide and an enduring representation of the Incas' resistance to the Spanish conquest.

The Legend of the Veiled Lady

She hooks people in with her **melancholy** and captivating appearance, and her voice is kind and seductive as she begs for comfort or companionship.

She leads folks to a faraway place when they agree to stay with her or go for a walk with her. She then lifts her veil to see her authentic face. The appearance of her face can be a terrifying skull in certain situations, or it can be an empty void in others. When someone sees her actual form, the shock is so extreme that they usually faint, lose their mind, or even pass away right away. In numerous **neighborhoods**, the Veiled Lady has become a symbol of warning and fear because of this terrifying experience.
