STOP	• [redacted] e.g.: He <u>stopped smoking</u> and returned to the flat. (I finished smoking and returned back to the flat.)	• [redacted] • to express purpose: e.g.: When he arrived at the station, he <u>stopped to smoke</u>. (He stopped in order to smoke.)
REMEMBER FORGET	• [redacted] (past memory): e.g.: I <u>remember visiting</u> the zoo when I was ten. (I remember how I visited the zoo when I was ten years old.) e.g.: I'll <u>never forget meeting</u> her for the first time. (I'll never forget how I met her for the first time.)	• [redacted] e.g.: Remember <u>to buy</u> milk on your way home. (Remember that you need to buy milk on your way home today.) e.g.: Don't <u>forget to phone</u> Alice in the evening. (You should phone Alice in the evening.)
REGRET	• [redacted] e.g.: I <u>regret telling</u> her that. Now she is not talking to me. (I am sorry that I've told her that.)	• [redacted] e.g.: I <u>regret to tell</u> you that your credit card is blocked. (I am sorry that I have to inform you about it.)
TRY	• [redacted] (a method of achieving the aim): e.g.: I have a headache. – <u>Try taking</u> some painkillers. Why don't you <u>try adding</u> more sugar to your coffee?	• [redacted] e.g.: She <u>tried to lose</u> weight for the summer, but the diet wasn't effective.

SEE WATCH HEAR NOTICE SMELL (verbs of perception)	• [redacted] (a part of an action): e.g.: I <u>heard him singing</u> in the bathroom when I arrived home.	• [redacted] (from the beginning to the end): e.g.: I <u>heard her sing</u> beautiful cover versions of three of my favourite songs at the concert yesterday.
