

Studying Conditionals and Quantifiers!

- **Conditionals** are sentences that describe possible situations and their consequences. They often include an "if" clause (condition) and a main clause (result).
- **Quantifiers** are words used before nouns to indicate quantity or amount. Examples include *some, any, many, much, a lot of, few, little*, etc.

- Describes universal truths and scientific facts.
- **Structure:** If + present simple, present simple.

Second Conditional

Hypothetical Situations

- Describes imaginary situations in the present or future.
- **Structure:** If + past simple, would + base verb.

1. If we had a bigger house,	A. I wouldn't need to work.
2. If he didn't spend so much money,	B. she would play basketball.
3. If she were taller,	C. we would invite more guests.
4. If I lived near the beach,	D. he would save more.
5. If she knew how to cook,	E. I would go swimming every day.

7. If they worked harder,	G. she wouldn't order takeout all the time.

Third Conditional

Regrets & Hypothetical Past

- Talks about past situations that did not happen and their possible consequences.
- **Structure:** If + past perfect, would have + past participle.

1. If I (study / had studied) harder, I (pass / would have passed) the test.
2. If she (wake up / had woken up) earlier, she (not miss / wouldn't have missed) the bus.
3. If they (not forget / hadn't forgotten) the tickets, they (see / would have seen) the concert.
4. If he (listen / had listened) to me, he (not get / wouldn't have gotten) lost.
5. If we (leave / had left) on time, we (arrive / would have arrived) earlier.
6. If you (not eat / hadn't eaten) too much, you (not feel / wouldn't have felt) sick.
7. If the car (not break down / hadn't broken down), we (get / would have gotten) there sooner.
