

# First Conditional

The first conditional is used when there is a real possibility that a condition will happen in the future.

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| <b>IF CLAUSE OR CONDITION = PRESENT SIMPLE</b><br><i>If it rains,</i>    | <b>MAIN CLAUSE OR RESULT = WILL</b><br><i>he will bring his umbrella</i> |
| <b>MAIN CLAUSE OR RESULT = WILL</b><br><i>He will bring his umbrella</i> | <b>IF CLAUSE OR CONDITION = PRESENT SIMPLE</b><br><i>if it rains.</i>    |
