South by Southwest

If you are ever in Texas around March, do not miss the chance to go to *South by Southwest*. Over a period of ten days, this incredibly popular festival offers a huge range of music, films, new technology and more. To me, it's made more special by taking place in a great city, although the weather can sometimes be a challenge.

It all started in July 1986, when the organizers first decided they wanted to set up a film festival. They'd enjoyed the New Music Seminar in New York City, which had been running since June 1980, and wanted to do something similar in Austin, the city where they lived. They worked hard and their first event was held in March 1987. The organizers thought that only one or two hundred people would show up, but instead it attracted nearly 700!

When they were deciding on a name for their festival, the organizers wanted to reflect the festival's theme. They were influenced by a famous director's film, *North by Northwest* by Alfred Hitchcock. They changed the title to suit the festival's location in Austin, Texas in the south of the United States.

Although not one of the top three cities of Texas by size, Austin has become a sort of cultural centre, especially during the festival. Concerts, films, and talks about new technology take place all over the city, from cinemas to cafes and restaurants. Everywhere you go, there is something new to discover.

People often perform or show their art in the festival to promote themselves or their products.

There are competitions for the performers, but for most of the participants it is about the experience, not about winning something. Both famous and less famous people take part, and many new singers, bands, directors and technology companies have been discovered at the festival.

You can pay different prices to attend the festival, depending on the event. You can buy tickets for individual events, with the cheapest one being \$10 to see a film. However, to make the most of the experience, people are advised to get a pass that gives them access to the important events in one category. If you book ahead, this is available at a big discount, and for most people this will probably be the best option. Alternatively, you can get a day pass if you're just in Austin for a limited time.

Avoid buying a full pass when the festival starts, as the price goes right up.
