She **wasn't** in class yesterday. **Was** she sick?
The Beatles **were** famous in the 1960s.
Where **were** you last night? You **weren't** at home.

- We use **was / were** to talk about the past.
- We often use **was / were** with past time expressions, e.g., *yesterday, last night, in 1945*, etc.
- We use **was / were** with **born**: *I was born in Vietnam.*

- **Contraction:** *didn't* = *did not*.
- Regular verbs in the past end in *-ed*, e.g., *worked, lived, played*.
- The simple past is the same for all persons (*I, you, she, etc.*).
- Use auxiliaries *did / didn't* + base form for simple past and . *Did* is the past of *do*.

7C simple past: irregular verbs

• Use the irregular past form only in sentences:

I saw a movie last night.

• Use the base form after *did / didn't*:

*Did you **see** a movie last night? NOT Did you **saw**...*

*I **didn't go** out last night. NOT I **didn't went**...*

• Remember the word order in questions:

auxiliary, subject, base form, e.g., *Did you go out last night?* or

question word, auxiliary, subject, base form, e.g., *Where did you go?*
