Tess, aged 20

I'm a student and, to earn a little bit of money, I do leafleting for local businesses. It's really dull work and quite tiring. I stand in the street all day on Saturday and give people leaflets for pizza restaurants, shops and children's play areas. Sometimes, the company I am working for gives me an outfit to put on – like a snail outfit for a French restaurant! I don't get paid much – £40 for a whole day. Sometimes, two of us work together. That's good because we can chat and laugh together.

Matt, aged 16

I live in a small town and there aren't many part-time jobs for people of my age. In fact, there aren't any. That's why I work for myself. I do tutoring. I'm very good at Maths and Sciences and a lot of children need help with these subjects. I go to their homes after school and help them with homework or revision. I only tutor one child a day, so I still get home by 5 p.m. I earn different amounts from different people. Some of the families don't have much money, so I don't charge much – but I never do it for free! When I have a lot of school work or when exams are coming up, I take a week off.

Sylvie, aged 17

I don't have a regular job, but when I need money, I do babysitting. The great thing is that I can say 'Yes' or 'No'. It depends on what my plans are, so I never miss any parties or concerts. I always work in the evening and it isn't hard work at all. The children I look after are asleep or getting ready for bed when I arrive. I tell them a story, switch their lights off and, after that, I can just sit and watch television. There is even food for me to eat and, for four hours, I earn £24.

REMEMBER BETTER

It is important to learn the pronunciation of new words along with their meaning. You can use Internet dictionaries which give pronunciation in both oral and written form (audio recordings and phonetic transcription). What's more, they often give British as well as American pronunciation of particular words.

REMEMBER THIS

To strengthen the meaning of a message, we can use so-called intensifiers, e.g. very (I'm tired – I'm very tired), at all, just, even, in fact, whole, etc.
