- We use possessive pronouns to talk about possession.
Is it **yours**? Yes, it's **mine**.
- We use *Whose* to ask about possession.
Whose book is it? **Whose** is that bag?
- We don't use possessive pronouns with a noun.
NOT *it's mine book*.
- We don't use *the* with possessive pronouns, e.g.,
Is this **yours**? **NOT** *is this the yours?*
