He began designs for what he called “traffic control bumps”. Speed humps are now [5] _____ around the world to [6] _____ drivers down. Usually 7.5 to 10 cm tall, they are put across a road where speeding cars have caused accidents in the past, [7] _____ where there might be people wanting to cross the road on foot. However, sometimes bumps are badly-designed and can be too [8] _____, which can be dangerous for drivers if they are not easy to see (especially at night). Drivers of sports cars often have problems driving over them because these cars are usually very low on the road and they sometimes damage [9] _____ bottom of their vehicles. [10] _____ many people dislike them, it seems speed humps are here to stay as they do prevent many accidents.
