Surviving in Alaska

Tyson Steele has always loved the idea of surviving on his own, far from everyday life. Therefore, he decided to build a cabin in the snowy forests of Alaska and live there.

One freezing night, Tyson got up to check on the wood burner. As the fire had nearly gone out, he threw a large piece of cardboard onto it. The fire grew so big and so rapidly that it set the roof on fire. Tyson managed to stay calm. He took a spade and started to throw snow on the fire. When he realised this wasn't helping, he ran outside wearing only the clothes he had been sleeping in. He didn't have time to collect any belongings. Eventually, the fire went out, but the cabin was mostly destroyed.

The temperature outside was -15 degrees so Tyson started to build a shelter from the pieces of wood and metal that survived. He heated it using the same wood burner that had burnt down his cabin. He also wrote HELP in big letters in the snow for any passing plane to see. From the fire, Tyson had managed to save several tins of food from his two-year supply. Hundreds of tins had been destroyed. He worked out that he could survive for thirty days on the tins that he had.

No one knew Tyson was alone in Alaska except for his family, who he had contacted by radio every week before the fire. When they hadn't heard from Tyson for two weeks, they were concerned. They called the Alaskan authorities and a helicopter was sent out. Fortunately, it only took the rescue team a few days to find Tyson and, three weeks after his frightening adventure began, he was safe.

Despite what happened in Alaska, Tyson is determined to go back there one day. 'I loved my warm, cosy cabin. Although I dreamed about takeaway pizza and hamburger and chips, I really enjoyed my own company and the challenge of keeping myself warm and fed,' said Tyson.
