The UAE is famous for its modern buildings and creative designs, but many of these structures are also connected to nature. Architects in the country often think about how people can live comfortably, even in hot weather. For example, some new buildings are designed to let the wind move freely through open spaces, helping to keep the air cool without using too much electricity.

In traditional Emirati houses, wind towers were used to bring fresh air into rooms. These towers collected the wind and sent it down into the house. Today, some new buildings use the same idea but with modern technology, such as sliding doors and sliding windows that open to let the breeze in.

Modern structures like the Burj Khalifa or the Museum of the Future also try to connect people with their surroundings.
