

1. Read the review of the programme and answer the questions.

What was the idea for explorers who travelled across the oceans before modern technology made journeys safer and faster? The documentary series *Voyages of the Dawn* brings these adventures to life in a colourful and engaging way. The programme follows a group of sailors in the early eighteenth century as they travel from Europe to distant islands. It focuses on the dangers of life at sea, but it also shows us how sailors used to navigate, prepare their ships, and survive long months away from home. We learn about the tools they used, the food they ate, and the challenges they faced every day. We can also compare the possible beauty of the open ocean with the crowded, busy ports where their journeys began.

Although the series shows the excitement of discovery, it also makes us think about the darker side of exploration. The sailors took leave and optimism, but we don't see much of the sickness, the hunger, or the fear that were common on most voyages. The programme also raises questions about the impact of European explorers on the people and places they visited. Some sailors believed they were bringing progress, but others began to realise that their journeys sometimes caused harm. This series invites us to think about these issues instead of showing only a heroic picture of the past. In the final episode, the captain says, "This was twice every part of who we are" and a young sailor replies, "And it shows us what kind of world we leave behind." You can watch repeats of the series on History World on Thursdays at 8 pm. It's fascinating viewing!
