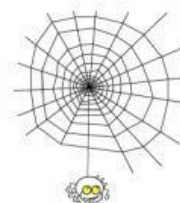

2 THE HISTORY OF HALLOWEEN

Task 1: Read the article then complete the writing exercise on the following page.

The history of Halloween is a diverse mix of ancient traditions, religious influences, and cultural changes that have shaped the holiday we know today. This celebration, which falls on October 31st, has its roots in Celtic and Christian traditions, but has evolved into a global, non-religious event.

Halloween can be traced back to the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, which was celebrated around November 1st. Samhain marked the end of the harvest season and the beginning of winter. The Celts believed that on the night before Samhain, the boundary between the living and the dead became blurred, allowing spirits to return to Earth. To stop these restless spirits, people lit bonfires and wore costumes made of animal skins.

When the Roman Empire conquered Celtic lands, they merged their own traditions with Samhain. This created two Roman festivals, Feralia and Pomona, which honoured the dead and the goddess of fruit and trees, respectively. These elements began to mix, creating modern Halloween.

Christianity played an important role in shaping Halloween. In the 7th century, Pope Boniface IV established All Saints' Day, a day to honour Christian saints. The night before became All Hallows' Eve, which eventually evolved into Halloween.

During the Middle Ages, Halloween evolved into a holiday with elements of the supernatural and the spooky. Superstitions and traditions such as costume-wearing and "souling" (the practice of going door-to-door for food in exchange for prayers for the dead) became more common.

Halloween made its way to the United States in the 19th century, primarily through Irish and Scottish immigrants. Over time, it began to include elements from various European traditions. By the early 20th century, Halloween had become a community-centred holiday, with parades, parties, and the familiar practice of trick-or-treating.

The commercialisation of Halloween in the mid-20th century, with the mass production of costumes and decorations, transformed it into the family-friendly celebration we know today. The holiday also spread to other countries, evolving in different ways, often incorporating local customs.

In recent times, Halloween has had a resurgence of interest in its historical and cultural roots. People have embraced the holiday's pagan, Celtic, and mediaeval origins, blending them with modern celebrations. As a result, Halloween has become a diverse holiday, where ancient traditions and modern customs coexist.
