Become organized and ready

Some people are always organized and ready to act. They "have their ducks in a row." Other people are disorganized. They need to "get their ducks in a row" and become ready for action.

CONVERSATION 1

Bianca: Traveling to the U.S. requires a lot of planning. There are travel visas, tickets, and passports.

Mike: It's so true. A person really needs to have their ducks in a row before traveling.

Bianca: You're right. I need to get my ducks in a row soon, or I won't be able to go.

Mike: It's a lot of work, but I know you can do it. You're going to love New York!

Be careful with this :

There are two verbs that can match the idea of "ducks in a row": have and get. Be careful, "to get ducks in a row" is different than "to have ducks in a row."

Someone who “has” something doesn’t need to “get” that thing, but someone who needs to “get” something doesn’t “have” it yet.

Someone who “has their ducks in row” is...
