

Quantifiers (A1)

- We use quantifiers to talk about “how many” or “how much” of something.

ALL	100%
MOST	about 80–90%
MANY / A LOT OF	60–70 %
SOME	40–50 %
NOT MANY	20–30 %
FEW	10 %
NO ONE	0 %

- Examples
 - **Most** families have two children.
 - **Many** parents work from home.
 - **Some** cousins live far away.
 - **Few** grandparents use smartphones.
 - **No one** in my family is a teenager.

Remember: Quantifiers are often used with **plural nouns** (e.g., students, people, women, men, children, etc.). But “**No one**” **does NOT need a noun**, and the verb must be used in **third person singular**. (**No one likes** cold weather. / **No one is** at home.)
