### Lecture Text

In English, we use will and going to to talk about the future.

We use will for quick decisions and predictions. For example: "I think it will be sunny today."

We use going to for plans and for things we already decided. For example: "I am going to visit my grandma this weekend."

Both forms talk about the future, but we choose one depending on the situation.
