

RISKS OF THE INTERNET

Don't protect your devices

A risky digital habit in which people share too much information online, too freely, without thinking about long-term consequences, making themselves vulnerable to exploitation.

Oversharing (sobreexposición)

A risky digital habit in which people fail to use security measures like passwords, updates, or antivirus, making their devices vulnerable to attacks, data theft, or harmful software.

Oversharenting (share+parenting)

A risky digital habit in which parents share too much about their children online.

Teachers and police say students should tell an adult, block the bully, and save evidence.

Teachers remind students to never send intimate photos, because nothing online is 100% private.

Police say to hang up, and then call the real number of the institution to check.

Banks say they never ask for passwords by email. People should not click strange links and check the sender.

Experts say students must not talk to strangers, not share personal information, and tell a trusted adult if something feels strange.

Experts say to download only from official websites, update antivirus, and avoid unknown files.

Psychologists recommend screen-free time, limits on apps, and activities without devices.
