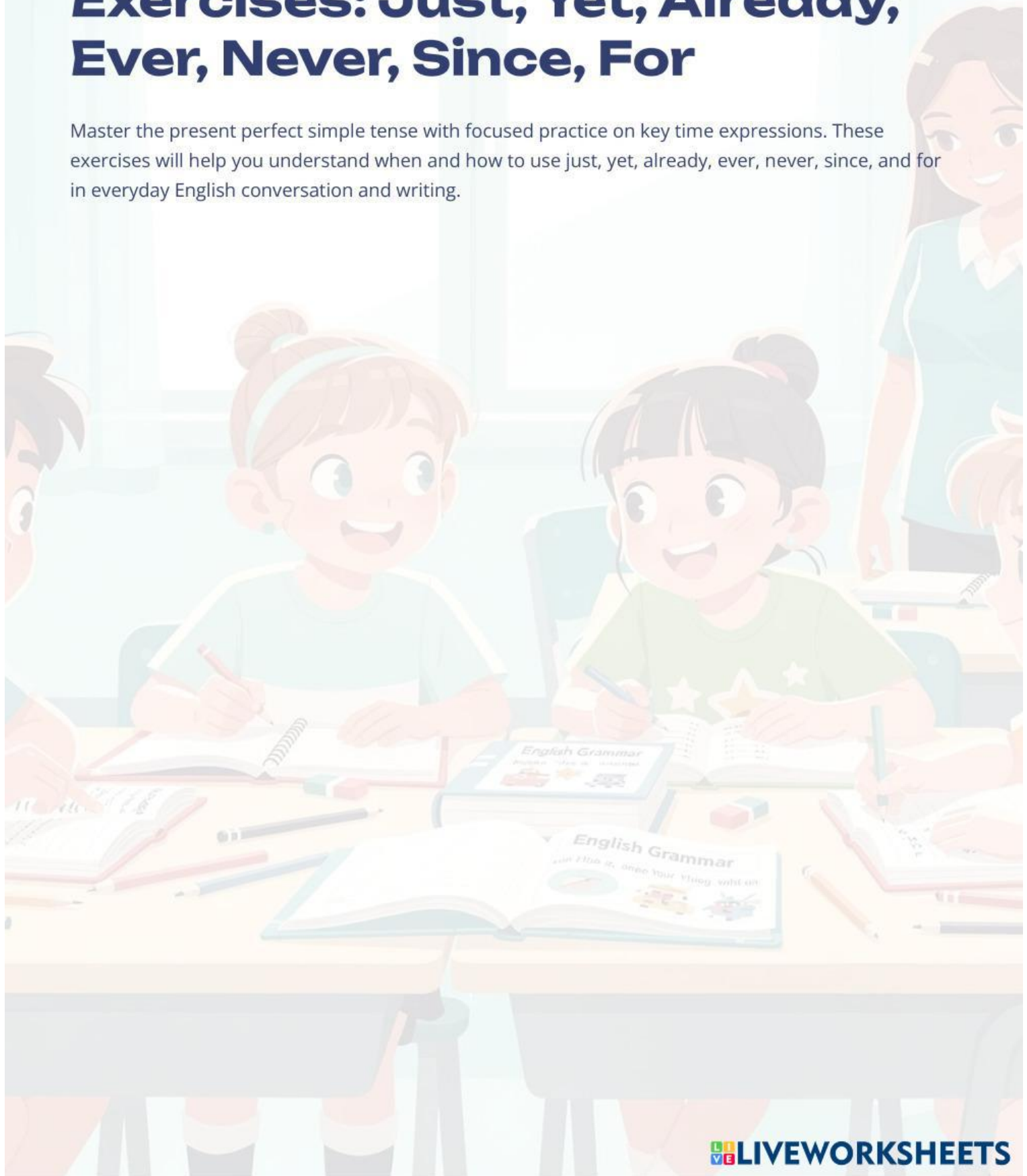


Present Perfect Simple Exercises: Just, Yet, Already, Ever, Never, Since, For
