- What **kind of world** do you think this film takes place in?
- What clues suggest that this is a **dystopian society** rather than a **normal one**?
- Why do you think the film is **shot in black and white**?
- What emotions does the **trailer** create: **curiosity, discomfort, humor, horror**?

Discussion:

1. Oppression and dystopian control

- Why might a society decide to **ban kissing or other forms of affection**?
- What does the **punishment** for kissing reveal about **the values of this society**?
- Why do you think **the law punishes desire rather than violence**?
- Why are **dystopian stories** often **effective at criticizing real social norms**?

2. Violence as social currency

- In the film, **slapping replaces money**. Why might the filmmakers **choose violence as a form of payment**?
- What does it say about the society the fact that **bruises become status symbols**?
- Why do some shop assistants in Lafayette Galleries **fake bruises**?
- What might the **slap symbolize**: punishment, power, desire or conformity?

3. Symbolism in names

The names of the main characters in this film function as **allegoric hints**. What aspects of that dystopian society do they represent?

- **Malaise**: meaning a feeling of *emotional unease or discomfort*;
- **Angine**: referring to *angina*, a disease of the heart;
- **Chagrin** (Angine's distant husband and a coffin maker for those executed for kissing): meaning **sorrow or grief**.

4. Setting and Consumer Culture

- Why is the **Lafayette Galleries** an effective stage for this story? (compare the homes of average people, those of wealthy people and the gallery as a converging point in this film)
- How does turning a **glamorous colourful store** into a **black-and-white site of violence** comment on **modern consumerism**?

5. The Punishment – circus for the masses or warning against rebellion and transgression?

- Why do you think the society in the film chooses to **punish only women** for expressing desire?
- How does **public execution as spectacle** serve the society in terms of **control and fear**?
- What parallels can you find with **historical or modern societies that use(d) punishment as a warning or public show**?

6. Big Picture

- If **affection is criminalized** and **violence is rewarded**, what does this say about **human nature and social control**?
- What's your take on the film **mixing humor and horror** (tragicomedy)?
- Which **elements** of this dystopia **feel exaggerated**, and which **feel familiar** in our modern world?
- What do you think the filmmakers want the audience to **feel or question** by the end of the film?
