BUILDINGS

Longaberger Basket Building — Ohio, USA

This building, known as the 'Big Basket', is in Newark, Ohio. It was the main office of a company, and it looks like the company's favourite product, a basket! It's made of wood and has 84 windows for sunlight. The basket has two handles, and each one weighs 75,000 kilograms!

Crooked House — Sopot, Poland

It's a shopping centre. It was made in 2004, and the architects got ideas from pictures in a children's book. This building looks like a cartoon house, dancing to a happy song. It's colourful outside with lots of fun details. The windows are different sizes and the roof is crooked*— it's like a magical place.

Meitan Tea Museum — Guizhou, China

The Meitan Tea Museum is a building that looks like a teapot. It was built in 2010, and it is in Meitan County, in China. Meitan is famous for Chinese green tea, so it's the perfect place for a tea culture museum. The building is 74 meters tall and has a diameter of 24 meters. It is the biggest teapot building in the world.

Dancing House —Prague, Czech Republic

This building was made in 1996. People also call it 'Ginger and Fred' because its towers look like the famous dancers Ginger Rogers and Fred Astaire. One tower is like the man and made of rock, and the other tower is like the woman and made of glass. Now, there's a hotel, a gallery, and a restaurant.

THE BIGGEST ANIMAL

Did you know the Blue Whale is the biggest animal ever on Earth?

The scientific name for blue whales is *Balaenoptera musculus*.

The Antarctic blue whale can weigh up to 200,000 kilograms and grow to a length of 30 metres. The heart of an Antarctic blue whale is as big as a small car and, when it swims through the ocean, it makes a noise louder than an aeroplane engine.

Blue whales live in oceans all around the world, but not in the Arctic. They sometimes swim in small groups, but usually they like to be alone or with one other whale. In the summer, they often go to cold waters to find food. When winter comes, they travel a long way to warmer areas near the Equator. It's surprising, but blue whales can swim very fast, sometimes even faster than 30 kilometres per hour. They dive* deep into the water, about 500 meters down, to find food.

These ocean giants are very big, but they eat some of the smallest animals in the sea, called 'krill' (similar to small shrimps**). One grown-up blue whale can eat 36,000 kilograms of krill every day. Blue whales don't have a lot of enemies, but sometimes sharks or killer whales can attack them. Also, each year, many blue whales are hurt or die because they crash into big ships.

Today, there is only a small number of blue whales in the oceans around the world. People hunted these amazing animals for a long time, and they almost disappeared. Now, they are protected by a global agreement*** called the International Whaling Convention. They are considered an endangered species now.
